Buffalo Lake Monitoring by Roger Levos

Some form of lake monitoring began when the lake association was founded. The primary goal at that time was to look for Eurasian Water Milfoil. I was selected as the lake monitor due to the amount of time I spent on the lake fishing. Well, my fishing time has decreased significantly, but I still make the observation trips looking out for invasive aquatic plant life. The invasive plant list has expanded as COLA keeps noting more and more invasive plants that are making their way into our Minnesota water system. As of this report Buffalo Lake appears to be free of any of the listed invasive plants.

One of the other jobs of the lake monitor is the measurement of the lake water levels. Each year the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources sends someone out to set a gauge in the water to a predetermined height. The gauge is located in front of our lake home and I document weekly lake level readings along with weekly rainfall amounts. This information is submitted to the DNR on a form via email. This data can be found on the DNR website under LakeFinder. The website is www.dnr.state.mn.us/lakefind and the Buffalo Lake reference number is 03035000.

The readings this year will be affected by the COVID-19 virus. The DNR did not send anyone this year to set the gauge. Instead, instructions were provided on how to set the gauge, but the gauge will not correlate to past years. Frankly, with the controlled outlet (the dam at the west end of the Buffalo Lake) we don't see wild swings in lake levels. I use the gauge to look for water flow obstructions upstream from Buffalo Lake which are usually beaver dams. So, if there is good rainfall and I see a decrease in the water level it tells me there is something stopping the flow.

The other monitoring task is checking water clarity. This involves lowering a 12" white disc into the water until you cannot see it, pulling it back up until it is visible, then measuring the distance from the disc to the surface of the water. These measurements were sent to the DNR with the water level readings but were not showing up on the above mentioned website. Checking into this, I found that I need to send the clarity measurements to a different DNR department. Now that I have the correct reporting site, these measurements should be on the website in the future.

Ice out for Buffalo Lake this spring was 4/25/2020. The water clarity was a reddish brown and the Secchi disc reading was only 7'. This is the second year I have seen this situation. The reddish brown color is dead organic plant life. Once the lake settles down after the turbulence caused by the ice going out and the silt sinks to the bottom the water clarity improves. Current readings are at 12.5'. As the water warms throughout the summer we will see these numbers drop to around the 11' range. We will see another drop in water clarity when the lake "turns over" in the fall (cold water on the surface sinks to the bottom causing the same type of turbulence as the ice out).

The water clarity readings are good indicators of the quality of the water. However, these numbers can be affected if lakes are infested with Zebra Mussels which filter the water making it clearer. While we do not have Zebra Mussels, I feel we do have an overabundance of snails in the lake which perform the same function of filtering the water. Interestingly, the water clarity readings show that the water leaving Buffalo Lake is clearer than the water coming in. I will see up to 1' of better water clarity readings on the west end of the lake versus the east end. Taking readings in the middle of the lake shows about 6" of improvement over the east end. Who gets the credit for that, the snails or good property owner lake management? Let's say good lake management! Keep up the good work and we'll see you on the lake – while social distancing, of course.

Bread Pudding with Rhubarb (or other fruit)

Mix together:

2 Cups Rhubarb (cut-up) 1/2 teaspoon Cinnamon 4 slices Toasted Bread 1 1/4 cup Sugar 2 Tablespoons (rounded) Flour

Pour into 8 inch greased pan.

Beat together:

2 Eggs 1/2 to 1 teaspoon Vanilla 1 1/2 Cup Milk 3 teaspoons Sugar

Pour mixture over the other ingredients in pan. Bake at 350 degrees for approximately 1 hour.

Note: Blueberries, apple, or any fruit you like in pie or cake will work. For blueberries add more cinnamon if you wish.
